



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### WISDOM FOR OUR JOURNEY

Are you among God's special people? Do you obey God? Well, God's special people in the book of Ezra did not obey God. So, God punished them. Our Life Application Sunday school (LASS) class learned that God allowed the King of Babylon and his army to defeat God's special people. So, most of them were ordered to live in Babylon, a long way from their country, Judah. Then, God allowed the Persian army to defeat the Babylonian army many years later. The book of Ezra tells about the King of Persia allowing the Jews to return to their own land. Some of the Jews by choice returned to Judah, but not all of them.

The story of some of God's special people returning to Judah, but not all of them, has been a significant part of our Sunday school discussion. It reminds us of some Christians' behavior since the federal COVID-19 PHE declaration ended last May. Specifically, some Christians have returned to in-person community of faith events and activities, and some have not. We, LASS classmates, are benefiting by the hybrid community learning method to the extent that we are saying, "I wouldn't take nothing for my journey now." We are experiencing the benefits of returning to our roots. Our roots include being the church-going type. So, all are encouraged to return to the community of faith in Jesus Christ and serve, while inviting others to join this beloved community. Our return contributes to hope, courage, inspiration, new views, perseverance, and wisdom. Consider: "Do not forsake wisdom, and she will protect you; love her, and she will watch over you" (Proverbs 4:6, NIV).

Wisdom over worry is in Psalm 37. In Scripture, wisdom that helps us live as God's people (Psalm 90:12, Job 28:28) has several meanings like human learning; true religion; godliness; the knowledge and fear of God; and sincere and uniform obedience to God's commands. Ezra means help. Different kinds of help like emotional, financial, humanistic, informational, and practical were needed during Ezra's day and today. Also, then and now wisdom is useful to get the best help. Wisdom has always helped those named "beautiful people" by Elizabeth Kübler-Ross. According to her, "The most beautiful people we have known are those who have known defeat, known suffering, known struggle, known loss, and have found their way out of the depths. These persons have an appreciation, a sensitivity, and an understanding of life that fills them with compassion, gentleness, and a deep loving concern. Beautiful people do not just happen." So, where are you on your "beautiful people" journey in life? Wherever it is, know that we benefit by asking God for wisdom (James 1:5, NIV).

### EXPERIENCING GRIEF

Our lives are full of uncertainties but the one thing we can be sure of is that all of us will experience the death of a loved one at some point. When we are faced with the loss of a family member or close friend, the pain of that loss can feel overwhelming. You may experience all kinds of difficult and unexpected emotions, from shock or anger to disbelief, guilt, and profound sadness. The pain of grief can also disrupt your physical health, making it difficult to sleep, eat, or even think straight. These are normal reactions to loss—and the more significant the loss, the more intense your grief will be. Some people will withdraw into themselves and retreat into depression and others will go on their merry way and pretend there is no noticeable impact on them.

The death of a loved one is often the cause of the most intense type of grief—but any loss can cause grief, including:

- Divorce or the loss of a relationship;
- The loss of a home or financial security;
- ·The loss of a job;
- ·The death of a pet; and
- A friend's serious illness.

If we are to remain emotionally healthy, we need to recognize the importance of acknowledging and appropriately dealing with grief. Pastor and psychologist Dr. Kenneth Haugk reminds us that grief is **Normal**, **Natural**, and **Necessary**.

Grieving is a highly individual experience; there is no right or wrong way to grieve. How you grieve depends on many factors, including your personality and coping style, your life experience, your faith, and how significant the loss was to you.

Inevitably, the grieving process takes time. Healing happens gradually; it cannot be forced or hurried—and there is no "normal" timetable for grieving. Some people start to feel better in weeks or months. For others, the grieving process is measured in years. Whatever your grief experience, it is important to be patient with yourself and allow the process to naturally unfold. This is the time to turn to your family and friends.

If you need more support, you can reach out to a Stephen Minister. Stephen Ministers provide one-to-one confidential Christian spiritual support and guidance to those experiencing life challenges such as grieving. They are available to listen and pray with those who need help. White Rock Baptist Church has a strong Stephen Ministry program. They listen, care, encourage, pray, and can help you through a tough time.

In addition, White Rock also has a confidential grief support ministry called "Life After Loss." Small group discussions are led by trained facilitators who guide and encourage participants as they grow through the grief process.
